Purposed constitutional amendment

Please see the relevant sections (highlighted) of the constitution which require amendments to be ratified at the AGM.

9 Powers & Duties of the Committee

The Committee shall:

- manage and oversee the activities of the Association;
- liaise with the University, through the Development and Alumni Relations Office;
- determine the annual membership subscription;
- organise events for members;
- maintain a list of membership benefits;
- produce an annual report on the activities of the Association;
- produce an annual set of accounts for independent review by a panel proposed by the committee and approved at the AGM (additional line for approval)
- have the power to fill casual vacancies, the members so appointed serving until the next Annual General Meeting;
- where appropriate, allocate sums in support of the University, consistent with the Association's Mission.

11 Annual General Meeting

11.1 There shall be an Annual General Meeting, the date, time and venue of which shall be determined

by the Committee. The quorum shall be twenty-five members.

- 11.2 The Secretary shall give members at least thirty days' notice of the date, time and venue of the meeting.
- 11.3 The Annual General Meeting shall:
- receive reports from the Secretary and the Treasurer;
- receive a report from the Queen's Women Graduates' Association and from any other subgroup accommodated in accordance with 8.2 above;
- elect the President and Vice-President;
- fill by election any other vacancies on the Committee;
- consider and if approved, adopt any amendments to the Constitution that have been duly proposed and notified;
- consider, and if approved adopt, any motion of which due notice has been given;
- appoint auditors (line to be removed)
- consider any other relevant business.
- 11.4 Any notice of motion shall be submitted in writing to the Secretary at least twenty-one days before

the date of the meeting and shall be signed by at least two members.

11.5 In order to be approved, any motion shall require a simple majority of those present and voting, except that a proposal to amend the Constitution shall require the support of two-thirds of those present and voting.
